Music at Uppingham

The Academic Music department sits within the wider music faculty, which is led by the Director of Music.

For pupils who strive to excel in music as part of a rounded education, Uppingham offers the best music provision of any non-specialist music school in the country. Music is quite simply a way of life at Uppingham. For any pupil with a passion for music, in any form - whether jazz or classical, polyphony or hip-hop - we offer boundless inspiration, opportunity and encouragement. We celebrate and support individual excellence and mass participation - catering to the musical ambitions and abilities of all pupils.

Throughout its history, Uppingham has been associated with music-making pioneers - and that spirt of adventure and vitality is sustained today by our internationally renowned director of music and our inspirational teaching team of professional musicians. Their work is enriched and extended by visiting worldclass performers who support our wide-ranging programme of masterclasses and workshops.

Our pupils have access to no fewer than three music schools, equipped with state-of-the art music technology and professional-quality performance spaces. Music-making runs through the whole community at Uppingham. Everyone who plays an instrument is encouraged to take a full part in group music-making, whether as part of major ensembles or orchestras (Concert Band, Symphony Orchestra, Jazz Orchestra, Wind band), or in specialist groups such as the Chamber Orchestra, String Ensemble, Pipe band, Percussion Ensemble, Guitar Ensemble or Wind Ensemble. Additionally, there are numerous choirs, including the Chapel and Chamber Choirs, Concert Choir, Paul David Studio Singers and various pupil-led close harmony groups. The pupils have a vast range of performance opportunities at all levels, from our weekly Lunchtime Concerts and regular Faculty concerts, Scholars' concerts and Jazz Jam evenings to our annual Recital Competition, Music for Remembrance, Advent Carol Service, sell-out Jazz Cocktails and Canapés concert, symphonic orchestral concert and summer musical showcase. Whilst most of our performances happen in and around Uppingham, we shall next term additionally be giving performances in London and Saffron Hall and, in the summer, the Chapel choir will tour to Italy.

In every musical endeavour, we challenge pupils to develop independence and self-discipline; to explore their own artistic identities. Our pupil-led orchestras, bands, ensembles and choirs stage regular professional-calibre performances, which never fail to leave audiences stunned by their quality and virtuosity.

Teaching in the Academic Music department is delivered by an experienced team of three specialist colleagues.

In the Fourth Form (Year 9) Music is offered alongside a range of creative subjects in a carousel; pupils may study it for half a term in the first six months of the year, and then again for a longer period in the second half of the year. The Fourth Form curriculum is designed to enthuse and challenge all of our pupils, from the highly able performers to those who arrive with very little previous musical experience. Constructed around the fundamental performing, composing and analytical skills, the curriculum allows pupils to build confidence, develop creativity, and hone critical skills. Pupils engage with musical styles and genres as diverse as Samba, jazz and film music. They additionally have the opportunity to make use of the School's extensive music technology resources, working in our studios to create, produce and record their own tracks.

There are currently around 50 pupils opting for Music GCSE, following the Edexcel course. At A level there is a set of pupils in each year group studying Music (Eduqas) and Music Technology (Edexcel). A significant proportion of A level Music or Music Technology pupils choose to pursue music in higher education.

The academic music classrooms within the music schools are well resourced and provide good creative spaces for teaching at the highest level.

Remuneration and Benefits

The School has its own salary scale for qualified teachers, which is reviewed annually. The scale starts at £33,000 and progression is possible to £60,000. Part time teachers are paid on a pro rata basis of the pay rate they would receive if employed full time in the same post. The School offers an extensive range of benefits including a school fee discount scheme for children of staff, free gym membership, subsidised medical scheme, excellent pension scheme, and Sodexo benefits including discounts in thousands of retail outlets, restaurants, cinemas and holiday providers.

All members of staff are expected to live within reasonable distance of the School so that they can contribute to boarding school life easily and effectively. Assistance with reasonable removal expenses is provided. School property is sometimes available initially, at a subsidised rate, for those who wish to rent, and some partly furnished flats are provided for those coming straight from university or overseas. Most staff prefer to buy their own houses in due course, and there is a wide range of property available in the town and surrounding villages.

One of Uppingham's great community strengths is dining in house. Each day teaching staff are invited to lunch in a boarding house; a genuine pleasure in the midst of a busy week.

Life in Rutland

Rutland - England's smallest county - is a beautiful part of the country. Uppingham town has two maintained primary schools and an 11-16 community college. There is a sixth form college in Oakham. Oakham School (six miles), Stamford School and Stamford High School (eleven miles) are independent schools which, between them, offer day education to boys and girls from eight plus; local parents and/or the schools concerned provide car or coach transport. There is a good GP surgery in the town. There is a considerable community of young children within the area.

The town is situated between Leicester and Peterborough. Nottingham, Northampton and Birmingham are also relatively close. Cambridge can be reached in 50 minutes and Oxford in an hour and a half. London is an hour by train from Corby, Kettering or Peterborough. Peterborough and Leicester have excellent shopping centres. Leicester, Nottingham and Birmingham all enjoy first-class theatre and concert facilities.
